

Guided Pathways and ASAP Matrix



In 2019, the Washington State Legislature passed the Workforce Education Investment Act, providing funding to all 34 community and technical colleges to implement Guided Pathways, a framework designed to create structured support for students from enrollment to completion. In 2023, Washington received a planning grant to explore the Accelerated Study in Associate Programs (ASAP)¹, which offers intensive support to full-time students to accelerate completion. While ASAP shares some similarities with Guided Pathways, Washington is not adopting ASAP as a statewide model.

This document compares key elements of Guided Pathways and ASAP.

If there are distinct populations we want to serve, we are not limited to specific majors, but there will be implications regarding pathways.</p>	<p><u>Guided Pathways Elements:</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Either mandatory orientation or mandatory first-year experience course AND either meta-major content or field-focused events • All students given career assessments and experience initial advising • Students advised to take program foundation course in term one • Students helped to develop an educational plan in term one AND can see plan online 	<p><u>Associated ASAP Elements:</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • ASAP Application and Information Session • ASAP Institute provides a day-long orientation • ASAP Advisor provides individual and comprehensive intake • ASAP Advisor develops a customized education plan to target developmental supports • Financial Support (ongoing)

<p><u>Guided Pathways Elements:</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Mandatory advising for returning students • Caseload advising AND advisors assigned by meta-major • Students helped to develop an educational plan in term 1 AND checkpoint advising or registration alerts • Classes scheduled based on students’ plan 	<p><u>Associated ASAP Elements:</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • ASAP advisors provide customized advisement • ASAP Career Development Services build students’ career awareness and preparation • ASAP Peer Mentors navigate college life and access critical services. • Block schedules to accelerate completion • Financial support (ongoing) 	<p><u>Guided Pathways Elements:</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Students placed in corequisite math AND corequisite support aligned with math subject • Instructional improvement in program foundation courses other than math by meta-major 	<p><u>Associated ASAP Elements:</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Maximum two quarters of pre-college math • Required to complete precollege courses in year one
